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The Stanford Vietnam Day Teach-In was organized by an ad-hoc committee of faculty and students and has been endorsed by more than 178 members of the University faculty. All costs are being paid by voluntary contributions.

Tonight's teach-in serves two purposes. It educates and, by its very occurrence, indicates concern over U.S. policy in Vietnam. We are sufficiently disturbed over the lack of community discussion and concern about this policy to carry the teach-in to Palo Alto on Tuesday.

To extend the teach-in, we shall walk from door to door in Palo Alto to engage people in discussion. We shall distribute literature and we shall speak on street corners. We seek both to clarify our own views and to promote debate about the underlying assumptions and probable consequences of United States policy.

Although our primary aim is to disseminate information and to instigate examination of our government's Vietnam policy we cannot avoid simultaneously criticizing this policy. To indicate our opposition, we shall circulate petitions urging our government to stop permanently its bombing of North Vietnam, to halt immediately its military build-up in South Vietnam and to enter negotiations to end the war. We shall also urge our government to provide more accurate and complete information to the public about the Vietnam situation.

The petitions, literature, and canvassing assignments will be distributed from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday at White Memorial Plaza.

To be meaningful and effective, the debate over Vietnam must penetrate beyond the academic world into the community. Massive student participation insures the success of this penetration. Join us in extending the teach-in to Palo Alto tomorrow.
