
We may leave the AEL today. President Pitzer has made this less difficult for us by stopping all research in the building. But our community will stay together.

PITZER ANNOUNCEMENT

President Pitzer has announced an SJC proposal which he will present to the Academic Senate at a special meeting called for 11:00 a.m. today.

The proposal, noting that our demonstration against war research "has lasted for seven full days and the time of voluntary termination cannot be ascertained" and that "a large number of persons has participated in the sit-in" recommends that the AEL "and the area immediately surrounding be declared closed" as of noon today. The area will remain closed to all persons, including AEL researchers, for a period of one week.

Today's morning meeting has been moved up to 9:00 a.m. to discuss the proposal before the special faculty meeting.

Initial reaction to the proposal, received at about 2 a.m. this morning, was favorable. Leafleting and telephoning plans were immediately adjusted for a mass meeting at AEL at 9:00 to discuss future action. People favorable to the SJC proposal are expected to move that we evacuate the AEL before noon today. Some of us were concerned that leaving the AEL might destroy our community and center of operations.

Plans to attend the student body general meeting at 1:00 p.m. in Frost were unaltered.
