

In a meeting that lasted seven hours, 800 members of the A3M voted to demand that the Academic Senate of Stanford University "recommend" that the administration withdraw a court injunction levelled at the movement.

The injunction, apparently a result of the recent occupation of Stanford's administration building, was served by Daniel DeYoung, Assistant Business manager of the university. In addition to enjoining the movement as a body from disruptive actions, the injunction specifically named 36 members of the movement and also provided for 500 'John Doe' indictments. The 'John Doe' indictments permit the university to extend the injunction to any student known to have participated in recent campus disruptions.

The injunction specified further that students who were suspended from the university for their actions are prohibited from entering the "principal campus" during the period of their suspension. An unknown number of students will be notified of their suspensions by mail Friday morning.

The A3M, somewhat divided in opinion over the occupation of the administration building when the meeting began, immediately reaffirmed its solidarity in light of the administration's drastic tactics. Faculty members attending the meeting expressed astonishment over the injunction order, stating that such action on the part of the administration had not been made clear to them prior to their vote in support of University president Kenneth Pitzer's handling of the Encina Hall occupation.

The movement also voted at the meeting to hold a rally in White Plaza at noon, Friday, May 2, to lay the groundwork for a possible student strike or class boycott.
