1. Sell your US Government Bonds - Phil Jackson (327-2920 x724) and Chris Maslách (x2280)

A display of no-confidence in the US Government by selling these relatively low interest bonds. How can a group urge the Stanford community and Palo Alto citizens to sell their bonds and pressure their leaders.

2. Telegram campaign - Coleen Rand (x3102)

A door-to-door campaign to discuss the South East Asian crisis with the community and to urge people to telegram Washington. You can show them a written telegram, ask them to sign their names and contribute a dollar, and you will send the telegram for them.

3. Attitude Change on Campus - Chris Peterson (328-9700, 327-2204)

A program of attitude change among the Stanford community. In a discussion, how are people polarized, how can their attitude be effectively changed, what are the best methods to use in discussing the anti-war movement with people who are uncommitted, reactionary, or unconcerned. It might be good to try some of the arguments out on Aero-Astro, for example, before moving to...

4. Attitude Change off Campus - Peter Arnold (321-1996)
-immediate canvassing x3102 or 9am daily GSBusiness Rm. 66

Go to the Industrial Park or Palo Alto to try to elicit statements of position against the war, to get support for the strike, to change attitudes. Urge merchants to close their businesses in support of the strike or "no business as usual".

5. News agency and coordinating committee for PACC - Staff (x2394)

To disseminate accurate information of this group's activities to the University, and the press. We will print up any reports of the specific groups. Please coordinate your activities through us.

6. Delegation to Sacramento or San Francisco - Tom Smart (328-0286)

Explore the possibility of sending a delegation to the California capitol or to a major conference in SF.

7. Research on Comparison to Hitler - Jim Wyatt (328-3431)

Research and write a paper comparing the present US situation to the rise of Hitler in Germany. What would have happened had the German universities closed down? Local high school German teachers' meeting Fri. 7:30 pm, TMU, large lounge.

8. Planning a student referendum - Caroline Kremers (327-2920 x1739)

How to word a referendum unambiguously. How to gather the most support for a referendum, such as off-ROTC, by teach-ins, rallies, discussions by faculty members. For possible export to other universities.

9. Nationwide strike - Pharmacology Dept. (321-1200 x5353) Arnow, Mizel, Pratt

How to organize and sustain a general strike throughout the country. What are the different approaches to blue-collar or white-collar workers? We will go to the NSA to find out what their plans are.

10. Back the Democrats

How to elicit support for Democratic candidates in the November elections. Possible canvassing for June primaries.

11. Contributions for the anti-war movement

Fund-raising and soliciting contributions for anti-war political candidates and organizations. What are the most psychologically effective ways of procuring money?

12. Unions on strike - Barbara Judson, Med School (321-1200 x5353)

To organize unions in support of local and nationwide strikes, perhaps with a Worker-Student Alliance (WSA). Are the workers and students compatible?

13. Stanford's ROTC and Cambodia - Don Nauney! (Head of ROTC)

Is ROTC at Stanford really connected with Cambodia? What are the attitudes of ROTC students toward the Cambodian situation? A group to explore this issue and write a report.

14. Presidential Powers
Research into the President's right to the action he has taken in Cambodia. What are Congress' limitations and rights in response to his actions?
15. University Phone Tax Nora Reza 328-4267
Why should Stanford University support the war effort by paying a phone tax? Does the government have a constitutional right to dock personal bank balances for phone taxes not paid by individuals?
16. Public Opinion Poll Tom Martin, Comm. Dept. x4903
Organize a poll to obtain people's reactions to Nixon's speech, to U.S. action in Cambodia (CBS reports 3-2 support for Nixon's action in Cambodia-- is this true?).

A police-oriented action group stressing exposure to police in various ways (discussions, dinners, riding in squad cars, encounter groups, etc.). The purpose of this contact is to facilitate "humanization" on all fronts (no more "them vs. us" stuff). Meeting: 8 p.m., Wednesday, Hawthorne House, 582 Alvarado Row.

Where do Chicanos stand? Why should the movement go to them for support? Are there differences in attitudes between Chicanos and Orientals in Chinatown, for example?
23. Political Prisoners Irwin Lavenberg 328-8039, 1024 Ramona Ct., P.A.
What is the background and legal complexities involved in freeing Huey, Bobby Seale and others? Do middle-class whites respond or react to the phrase "political prisoners"?

24. Nixon's Draft Strategy
Nixon has made more moves toward reforming the draft. Are these actual reforms, how do they apply to students, how are they involved in his policies in Cambodia? What is he doing?
25. Big Money Hans Dankers 651-1241
Many Stanford students have direct or indirect influence on people who own or control large amounts of money. Lundborg, Chairman of the Board for Bank of America, swings a lot of weight when he speaks out against the war. How to get more big money men (e.g., Langendorf) to do the same.
