## Supt. Raps Teachers' Tactics

SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Supt. Paul Nielsen Tuesday accused striking South San Francisco teachers of unfair tactics.

He said many of the strikers were calling parents to tell them not to send their children to school. "We are continuing quality education with professional teachers," he said.

The district's 635 teachers went on strike last Friday.

A spokesman for the strikers said Nielsen was "desperate and frantic" and said teachers have been "dignified" throughout the dispute. Nielsen again urged the teachers to accept the district's offer to turn the dispute over to the California Conciliation Service. The teachers say they must have a "fair" offer before they will let the service handle the walkout.

## Stanford Students Enter ROTC Program at SCU

STANFORD — Seven sophomores at Stanford University will take Army Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) courses at University of Santa Clara.

The disclosure Tuesday by Stanford marks the first Stanford student involvement in ROTC since Stanford's departments were phased out in 1973.

No Stanford academic credit will be involved, President Richard W. Lyman said.

The new arrangement was endorsed by Lyman in a letter to Army Brig. Gen. Sinclair Melner.

"I am impressed by the willingness of these students to enter an ROTC program at no little inconvenience to themselves," Lyman said.

Graduate student Robert Barker last March canvassed student interest in ROTC and the new set-up was an outgrowth of the interest expressed.
